Culturally Sensitive Halloween Costume Tips:

Choose costumes that are not tied to one culture, heritage or disability.

- Native Americans represent many cultures and diverse tribes; it should never be a costume.
- Latino costumes, such as señorita, should not be used. It stereotypes women and must be avoided.
- Anything with "Black face." Avoid costumes that change the color of your skin!
- Anything that mocks disabilities, such as a wheelchair for people who
 do not use one.
- Hair styles that you would not normally wear as part of your culture, such as braids, locks or hijabs.




NOVEMBER IS BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH






